GABRIEL'S ART ASSIGNMENT IN SURREALISM

Gabriel, our GRSP student, shares this art class assignment experience

We have been studying Surrealism in my art class. Our professor told us he wanted us to experience being lost. My plan was to have an Uber leave me at some random location that I did not know and without my cell phone. Another international student joined in the fun. We chose a rainy day to make directions more difficult, and we had an Uber driver leave us at some location unknown to us. The streets were curved, and the houses looked the same. For me, it was a weird feeling but a good way to experience new spaces in the city. But the absence of known reference points (the unknown) made me uncomfortable and a little fearful. It was easy to imagine possible disasters. The thought of being physically lost affected my mental state. But, there was less anxiety because I was not alone. I found that the feeling of being lost increased my awareness of our surroundings. We were more attentive to street signs, the features of buildings, and other signs. I did not have a camera, but I clearly remember the images we experienced. We chose a random direction to start. I found it entirely different from the Brazilian neighborhoods I knew where almost every city is built on a grid. The curvy streets here made me feel even more lost. There were no sidewalks which added to the discomfort. As we walked along the roadway, cars passed very close to us adding even more discomfort. We eventually arrived at a rail line which I felt I knew would help us find a way back to familiar surroundings. We guessed a direction and walked 20 to 30 minutes. We saw a bus with a destination of Prince Avenue going in the opposite direction. Knowing that street, we turned around and walked another 40 minutes. We became very tired and could find no restaurants or retail stores. We finally asked directions finding out we were 5 miles from campus and going in the wrong direction! Despite all the upsetting feelings, the experience was an effective assignment and an exciting way to learn the city. Very surreal, huh?
